Arthur C. Clarke, a renowned British science fiction writer was born on 16 December, 1917 in England. He wrote under the pen names Charles Wills and E.G. O'Brien. Arthur C. Clarke was a novelist, television host, inventor and film screen writer. He wrote science fiction, television series and film screen play. In 1961 he won Kalinga Prize, an award given by UNESCO for popularizing science. He also won Hugo and Nebulla awards. Arthur c. Clarke was Chairman of the Interplanetary Society. He got the Highest Civil Honour of SriLanka 'Sri Lankabhimanya 2005'. Clarke, Robert Heinlein and Isaac Asimov were the 'Big Three' of Science fiction. 'The Prophet of the Space Age', 'Childhood's End, 2001' 'A Space Odyssey' and 'Rendezvous with Rana' are some of his famous works.

- The scope
- Duration, data collection, detailed discussion and their analysis
- Conclusion

Kalaripayatt – the Oldest Martial Art

It is believed that the oldest traditional martial art form Kalaripayatt was born in Kerala in 13th century. Bodhi Dharma, the Budhist Indian monk introduced it as Kelari in China and Japan. It is more than a martial art. It teaches the practitioner philosophy and medicine. It helps one to protect oneself from attacks. Mostly it is used as a self-defence art to avoid unnecessary confrontations. It focuses on acupressure also. It trains one's mind and body. Those who practiced Kalaripayatt were treated with great respect and honour. Thus, it is the most complete, scientific martial art and hence is rightly called "the mother of all martial arts".
